

# **Unfair contract terms:** Small business contracts

## Key messages

- The Treasury Legislation Amendment (Small Business and Unfair Contract Terms) Act 2015 "Act" was enacted on 12 November 2015.
- The Act commenced on 12 November 2015, however a 12 month transition period applies which will expire on 11 November 2016.
- 3 The effect of the Act will be wide ranging and strategic reviews will be essential.

### **Small business contracts**



A contract will be a 'small business contract' if it is a standard form contract and, at the time of the contract, one of the parties is a business that employs

WHAT TO LOOK OUT FOR

12 MONTH IMPLEMENTATION PERIOD TO ALLOW BUSINESS TO COMPLY

#### Unfair

A term can be considered unfair if it:



causes a significant imbalance in parties' rights and obligations under the contract



is not reasonably necessary to protect the legitimate interests of the advantaged party



would cause detriment to the small business if it is relied on
